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

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Ecology Scholar and International Biodiversity Expert, Giselle Tamayo-Castillo to Speak at SVSU

Saginaw Valley State University will host renowned scholar and preservationist Giselle Tamayo-Castillo for a public lecture Thursday, April 20 at 7 p.m. in the Rhea Miller Recital Hall.

A professor of chemistry at the University of Costa Rica, Tamayo-Castillo will discuss the creation of the National Institute of Biodiversity, its successes and failures, and her personal involvement with this private, not-for-profit organization.


Also the president of the National Council for Science and Technology, Tamayo-Castillo has published more than 50 articles on biodiversity and, as a scholar, is particularly interested in the ecology of the Central American rainforests. Her research has focused on both natural products that may have therapeutic value as well as complex microbial ecosystems.

Costa Rica possesses only 4 percent of the world's biodiversity, yet by square mile, is one of the most diverse countries on the planet. Efforts to preserve this biodiversity date back to Costa Rica's earliest days as an independent nation and were strengthened under various administrations in the late twentieth century. Despite these efforts, by the 1980s, industrial and agricultural expansion had begun to threaten pristine areas.

Tamayo-Castillo received her doctorate in natural sciences from the Technical University of Berlin in Germany and has held numerous leadership positions in national and international academies of science.

The SVSU event is open to the public and free of charge. Tamayo-Castillo is visiting through the Dow Visiting Scholars & Artists program at SVSU, which was established through an endowment from The Herbert H. and Grace A. Dow Foundation to enrich our region's cultural and intellectual opportunities.

Saginaw County Department of Public Health Recognizes STD Awareness Month

April is Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD) Awareness Month, a time to get yourself tested for STDs and raise awareness of the importance of protection. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is dedicating all of the STD Awareness Month to syphilis prevention. According to the CDC, syphilis is now on the rise again and has reached a critical high: the current number and rate of cases is higher than it's been in more than 20 years. In 2015, there were close to 24,000 cases of syphilis reported in the U.S. - that was almost a 20% overall increase since 2014 alone.

The rise in syphilis infections makes syphilis a renewed health threat for many. Left untreated, syphilis can cause severe health problems affecting the brain, eyes, heart and other organs. Syphilis can also increase a person's risk for getting HIV. The good news is that syphilis is simple to cure with the right treatment.



The only way to avoid syphilis and other STDs is to not have vaginal, anal, or oral sex. However if you are sexually active, you can do the following things to lower your chances of getting syphilis:

- Be in a long-term, monogamous relationship with a partner who's tested negative for syphilis and other STDs.
- Use latex condoms every time you have sex.
- Talk openly and honestly with your healthcare provider and ask what tests may be right for you. If you test positive for syphilis, get treated right away and be sure your sexual partner is treated as well to reduce the risk of re-infection.

How To Find A Gym And Start Exercising

Joining a gym for the first time or after a period of inactivity can be a little scary. I hope this article will make your fitness journey a little easier.

Aren't all gyms pretty much the same?

The short answer would be. NO. Every gym has it's own personality both in the equipment and the type of people it attracts. Some gyms cater to weight lifters with lots of free weights and little else, while other facilities might cater to working women and offer activities such as yoga, spinning or aerobics. There are locally owned gyms and nationwide chains. Small gyms as well as mega fitness centers. There is a gym for everybody but it will take a little footwork to find your perfect fit.

What's the most important feature when looking for a gym?

In my opinion, location must be considered before anything else. Absence will not make the heart grow fonder. A gym more than 10 minutes from your home or office will end up not getting used. If you like to work out in the morning you might want to stick with gyms close to home. If you're a lunchtime sweat maven then a gym near work could be a better option. Some of the larger chains may have facilities by both work and home. In addition, if you travel, gyms with multiple locations may let you work out for FREE, or at a discount, if they have a facility at your travel destination.

Other Features to Consider

Membership Clientele – Check out the other patrons in the gym you are considering. Each gym has it's own personality. Is it mostly women or men? Is everybody wearing fashionable workout gear or is it a shorts and t-shirt crowd? Does it cater to families or is it an adult's only gym?

Equipment - The quality and variety of equipment is very important if you plan on starting a comprehensive fitness program. Is the equipment well maintained? Check to see how many machines are "out of order". Check to see if free weights are offered as well as machines. Is there an adequate cardio section with plenty of bikes, climbers and treadmills? These tend to be high use pieces of equipment so it is important that the facility have several.

Hours - Everybody has different times for his or her workouts. Make sure the gym you choose will accommodate your schedule. If you are an early bird and your gym opens at 10:00 a.m. then you are probably going to end up not using it despite the other features you find appealing.

Price - Don't get fooled by a low-ball price. Make sure the membership includes the use of everything of interest to you. Some gyms have a low membership fee and then charge extra for using the tennis courts, pool, classes etc. Read the fine print. Also, there are all-inclusive low priced gyms that are in the business of selling memberships and don't really care what happens after you sign up. You may find that half your town has a membership and you have to wait in line to use the equipment.

Management - Is there an active owner or manager on the premises? What is there policy regarding restacking your weights and the playing of loud music? In some gyms, anything goes and you may hear 3 or 4 different stereos playing at the same time, weights are thrown around and you can never find the equipment you would like to use.

This is a sign of poor and inattentive management and should probably be removed from consideration.

Everybody is different and there is not a single solution for picking the ideal gym. The key is to find a place that you feel comfortable and that you will use on a regular basis. Working out is a habit that takes time to form. Don't make an impulsive decision that will cause you to lose your desire to get in shape.

Before making a commitment, visit and workout at a few gyms that you are considering. Most facilities will let you try them out for a few days. Make sure you go at the times you would if you were to join. This will give you a feel for how crowded the equipment is at that time. 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

"Flint's entrepreneurial spirit is flourishing due in large part to visionary companies like SkyPoint that are helping to foster growth across the region and creating more jobs and opportunities for local residents," said Gov. Rick Snyder.


Featuring 46,000 square feet, the highlight of the renovated Ferris Building will be the introduction of 100K Ideas at the Ferris Wheel, the first innovation platform of its kind in the region. The brainchild of David Ollila, president and chief innovation officer at Skypoint, 100K Ideas is modeled after its successful counterpart in Marquette, Invent@NMU, also founded by Ollila. The hub will put a new spin on the way innovators approach the startup process by offering a "one-stop-shop" to support them from concept to commercialization.

"Not only will this project redevelop a seven-story vacant building in downtown Flint, but the business climate and entrepreneurial hub will add vibrancy, people on the street, and a viable way forward for many Flint residents well into the future," said Steve Arwood, CEO of Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC), the state's business marketing and attraction arm that administers and performs due diligence on economic programs on behalf of MSF.

"Our hope is that entrepreneurial businesses graduating from the space will continue to thrive in downtown Flint, locating their businesses to surrounding buildings and commercial spaces," said Arwood.

Offering a full spectrum of services to all individuals and companies with a product, software, service or social venture at any stage in the business cycle, 100K Ideas support will include idea validation, concept ideation, product development, prototyping, capitalization, market development, operations management and business formation.

"The most innovative aspect of 100K Ideas at the Ferris Wheel is how it incorporates so many aspects

of the community," said Phil Hagerman, CEO of Skypoint Ventures.

"From local university students gaining real job experience in their field by assisting inventors with bringing products from concept to market, to providing aspiring entrepreneurs in the community with access to workshops, competitions, boot camps and demo days through our partnership with U of M Flint," said Hagerman. "With the success David achieved at Invent@NMU, we are eager to see the impact the Ferris Wheel will have across Flint."

Located at 615 South Saginaw Street, the newly dedicated Ferris Building will be comprised of co-working space, a conference center and retail service area to meet the needs of entrepreneurs at all levels.

The investment by the MSF allocates \$1.5 million to the establishment of the Ferris Wheel Innovation Center Business Incubator Grant and \$1 million

through the Michigan Community Revitalization Program to assist the redevelopment of the Ferris Building where the innovation center is housed. It is the latest in a series of efforts to foster long-term economic growth across in Flint.

Earlier this month, MSF approved approved a \$450,000 performance-based grant to support an investment by Huntington Bank to create 60 new jobs and invest nearly \$5.4 million in downtown. Huntington's venture includes renovation to accommodate a call center at the former headquarters of First Merit, which the bank acquired in 2016. The building is located on Saginaw Street across from University of Michigan-Flint campus.

Today's approved initiative is supported by MEDC's entrepreneur and innovation division, which is committed to making Michigan an ideal place to launch and grow a business by building and supporting a thriving entrepreneurial ecosystem across the state.



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Ways to de-energize your board

There is an ideal board in the consciousness of many nonprofit leaders. It often involves members who are engaged in governance and fundraising; who advocate for the organization; and serve as community ambassadors building relationships and partnerships. These ideal board members are well connected with time to spare. They magically appear, need no support or attention, and easily attract others of like-mind.

In reality, too many nonprofit boards are far from this ideal. The directors who report to these boards are pulled in many directions, forced to "wear many hats," and struggling with too much to do and too few resources. Building and sustaining an engaged board is another item on a never-ending to-do list. It's one of many items that are moved to "next week."

The dream of an ideal board co-exists with actions that will eventually de-energize even the most engaged board. While energizing your board will require time and attention, we can offer an easier alternative: five ways to de-energize your board. As you can imagine, many of these are easy to implement.

- 1. Fail to communicate. There are many ways to accomplish this. These include changing the date and time of the board meeting, and changing it often, with little notice. Present inaccurate data with information that is confusing with internal inconsistencies. Send materials to board members at the last minute. Send them by email with 10 different attachments that need to be opened individually.
- 2. Fail to resolve issues as they arise. Continue discussion on low-priority items for several months. Contribute to ongoing "issues" by being evasive and inaccessible. Don't worry about distributing minutes and reports in a timely manner. Don't proofread materials.
- 3. Ignore suggestions and offers of assistance provided by board members. Let them bring up their ideas meeting after meeting. Eventually they will stop. Prohibit staff from following up with board members, and actively discourage initiatives that board members want to organize independently.

Use the same agenda for each meeting: keep it full of reports from staff. Don't allow time for board members to engage and provide input. Don't let the board chair create the agenda, set meeting dates, or set goals for board involvement. Don't meet with the chair in-between meetings.

Recruit community leaders and then ignore their capabilities and connections. Stay busy so you don't have time to learn the resources and funding that board members can give, raise or attract. Fail to plan and then ask for help at the last minute when the timeframe is unrealistic and the chances of success are slim. Increase the likelihood of disillusionment by failing to define goals, roles and responsibilities. And when you do define these, do it on your own without consulting the board. Don't collaborate.

These are five ways to ensure poor attendance, boring meetings, and a de-energized board. It doesn't have to be this way, but you will have to do something to change the situation. Ideally you will take action with your board. Together you can reenergize.

FIRST Robotics Student Enjoys Competition at SVSU, Her Future College Home

More than two hours away from her house, Alina DeVoogd feels completely at "home."

The Algonac High School senior is among the nearly 5,000 high school students attending the statewide FIRST Robotics competition hosted by Saginaw Valley State University this week. From Thursday to Saturday, April 13-15, 160 teams from Michigan — from Adrian to Zeeland — are competing against each other using autonomous and remote-controlled robots piloted by students.

The occasion converged two of the things DeVoogd has "fallen in love with": the high school robotics competition that has captured her imagination and attention for two years, and the university she plans to attend in the fall.

"I was so excited when I heard SVSU would be hosting FIRST for the first time this year," she said.

"I thought that was the perfect combination. The environments for both have a lot in common: There's real energy and both have such caring people. They both make you feel like you're at home."

DeVoogd's excitement for the team-up was strong enough that she attended the Thursday-through-Sunday competition despite the fact her team, Algonac High School's Full Metal Muskrats, did not advance beyond the regional tournaments that preceded the SVSU-hosted contest.

"I couldn't miss this," she said.

DeVoogd first fell for FIRST Robotics when her high school created the Muskrats team two years ago. She signed up as part of the group's marketing team, charged with promoting the team and seeking funds. The fit was perfect for the future marketing major at SVSU.

"It was a great opportunity I couldn't pass up," she said.

This year, DeVoogd helped the Muskrats secure sponsorships from NASA, Ford Motor Co., Lowe's Home Improvement, and a few local businesses from her hometown, she said.

"Building the robots is very expensive, so every bit helps," she said.

One sponsor donated a 3-D printer for the team's purposes.

"I fell in love with the FIRST Robotics community and environment," she said. "The constant kindness you find on these FIRST teams is incredible."

DeVoogd said she expects to remain involved in FIRST Robotics as a mentor after she graduates from high school.

"It makes me happy to help others," she said.

That same characteristic was partly what attracted her to SVSU. She was familiar with the university because of a friend who attended the institution. After participating in a campus tour, DeVoogd was sold that SVSU was a perfect fit for her.

"I really loved the feel of the environment," said DeVoogd, who earned the university's President's Scholarship and plans to live on campus. "It was a place where I could tell the faculty really cared about the students. It felt comfortable."

DeVoogd said she hopes the high school students attending this week's competition are inspired by the shared values of FIRST Robotics and SVSU.

"I hope they fall in love with both too," she said. "I hope they feel like this isn't someplace that you go to just walk through: It's like home."



Delta College Commits to Improving the Success of College Men of Color

Delta College has joined the Community College Equity Assessment Lab (CCEAL) National Consortium on College Men of Color (NCCMC). Participation in the NCCMC will enhance our commitment to improving the success of historically underrepresented and underserved students, including men of color.

Despite programs designed to enhance outcomes for men of color, in the United States only 17% and 15% of Black and Latino men, respectively, earn a certificate, degree, or transfer from a community college to a four-year institution in six years. Figures for men from other ethnic groups (e.g., Native American, Southeast Asian) also indicate an insurmountable need for improvement.

To combat this achievement gap, the NCCMC facilitates an exchange of ideas between community colleges across the nation on how best to serve men of color in our educational institutions. Community colleges convene to share their efforts and learn about new strategies for enhancing the success of men of color.

"Delta College's engagement in the NCCMC will enhance professional development for faculty and staff, enable informed interventions for our current programs serving men of color and inspire new initiatives addressing challenges facing these men," said Carlos McMath, Coordinator of Delta College Diversity Services.

"This innovative group of college leaders will be instrumental in implementing cutting-edge practices and policies to address the achievement gap facing underrepresented men," said Dr. J. Luke Wood, codirector of CCEAL.

Launched in February 2015, the CCEAL has already seen much success in information-sharing between community colleges. An average of more than 1,000 consortium members participates in each webinar.

"It is inspiring to see educators collaborate and openly share innovative ideas for serving men of color," said Frank Harris III, co-director of CCEAL. "We look forward to the future of CCEAL and the future success of men of color."







Congressman Dan Kildee: State of Michigan Should Reject Nestlé Water Withdrawal Permit


Congressman Dan Kildee (MI-05) today expressed his "strong opposition" to Nestlé North America's (Nestlé) request for a permit to dramatically increase its groundwater withdrawals in Evart Township, Mich. In a letter sent to the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality, Congressman Kildee urged the state to reject the permit application because, according to scientific experts, "it would have damaging and negative impacts to the environment and wildlife in Michigan."

"I support Nestlé's desire to create jobs in Michigan, but not at the cost of damaging our environment and depleting our state's water resources," Congressman Kildee said. "In Michigan, tourism, hunting and fishing generate billions in annual economic activity and support hundreds of thousands of good-paying jobs in Michigan. Thus, putting our freshwater resources at jeopardy threatens our economy and way of life."

On Wednesday, hundreds of people attended a public hearing in Big Rapids, where most voiced their opposition to Nestlé's plan. Nestlé is seeking a state permit to increase the amount of water it takes out of the ground from 250 gallons per minute to 400 gallons per minute. According to Nestlé's own studies, the proposed water withdrawal will have a direct impact on surface wetlands due to the local geology.

"I am concerned that Nestlé is seeking to rush this proposal through without much public input. It is unfortunate that Nestlé is more concerned with corporate profits over protecting natural resources that support our state's economy, jobs and way of life," Congressman Kildee continued.

testSantos kept Dayton off the board over the final 6.1 innings out of the bullpen.

The 13 hits for the Loons were the most in a game this season, along with the 11 combined strikeouts from the pitching staff.

James Vasquez was the lone Dragons player with a multi-hit game going 2-for-4, while Andrew Jordan (L, 1-1) was saddled with allowing four runs on six hits over three innings in his start for Dayton (7-3).

All 16 teams in the MWL will observe the first official off day of the season on Easter Sunday. The Loons head to Indiana on Monday for a three-game series with South Bend Cubs. Each game will begin at 7:05 p.m. and carried live on ESPN 100.9-FM with Chris Vosters and Brad Tunney. The Loons return to Dow Diamond on Thursday when they begin a seven-game homestand. The Fort Wayne TinCaps and Lake County Captains will make their first trips of the season to Midland.
