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

# Increase Your Fundraising Success With Matching Gifts

There's a public secret that benefits many individuals and nonprofits. It's called matching gifts. That's the term for when an employer – or other organization – commits to make a gift to a nonprofit that "matches" the gift made by an employee or other qualified individual. Sometimes there are "qualifications" or "restrictions" set on these gifts, sometimes not. Here's a simple example: you make a gift to a nonprofit and ask for a receipt. You submit the receipt to your human resources office. A gift is then made from your employer to the nonprofit. That's it – instant money!

Matching gifts programs – when utilized – make a significant difference in the fundraising growth of a nonprofit. Unfortunately, in too many cases people are not aware, don't know they are eligible, or just don't participate. These programs are both an employee benefit and one way that businesses and corporations give back to the community. A matching gift program ensures that funds are directed to organizations that employees believe in.

#### Tips for employers with a matching gift program.

- Let your employees know about the program. Include information on your website and in new employee sessions.
- Communicate the steps that need to be followed, online links to forms, and limitations if any.
- If different levels of matching are available, let people know what those are.
- Promote the giving program and highlight organizations who benefit and employees who give.

#### **Tips for donors**

- Check to see if you are eligible to participate in a matching gift program.
- Ask coworkers to join you in making a meaningful gift to a nonprofit. When you ask others to give and their gifts are matched you increase your impact in the community.
- Don't be discouraged by the "paper work" that might be associated with the program.
- Follow up with the nonprofit to make sure they received the matching gift, and that they know you are one of the people whose gift is being matched.

#### Tips for nonprofits.

- Make matching gifts part of your fundraising strategy.
- Create awareness and educate your constituency about how they can increase
- their gift without giving more than they can.
- Train staff and volunteers in how to talk with donors about matching gifts.
- Don't be afraid to personally reach out to donors you know are employed by an organization with a matching gift program to discuss the importance of using the program and the impact that will have on your nonprofit.
- Acknowledge and recognize donors who make use of their matching gift program
- Encourage matching gift donors to invite their co-workers to support your organization.

• When reporting your fundraising results, highlight the impact matching gift programs make, and list the donors and businesses who have participated.



Club boys embark on a journey to become responsible, healthy and courageous young men through the Passport to Manhood program. In the program, boys learn important life skills from local leaders.









# Only Floss The Teeth You Want To Keep!

Dear Dr. Nash,
I am very concerned about my
overall health and I know there is a
connection between being healthy
overall and good oral health. Could
you please tell me what is the best way
to take care of your teeth. I want to be
able to keep my teeth as long as I can
and be healthy just as long.

Best, Antonio

Antonio,

I will be honored to explain to you the best basic way to take care of those "Pearly Whites". And you are correct that there is a connection between good oral health and good general health. At this point I will not get into what connections have been proven, that will come in another article. But if you follow the basic instructions I will outline in this

article, most of your teeth should last you a lifetime.

Basics for taking care of your teeth would be to floss once a day, brushing your teeth twice a day with a good toothpaste that contains fluoride and to make sure you see your dental professional twice a year. Most dental insurance plans will cover preventative dentistry at almost no cost to the patient and I am saddened to say that a lot of people do not take advantage of this benefit and let their teeth break down when they could have been saved.

Here you will find the a basic outline on at-home dental care:

When buying a toothbrush, find one that will reach all the surfaces of your teeth. If you have a situation where you can't hold a toothbrush well, look into getting an electric toothbrush, but you can do a good job with a hand-held toothbrush. If your toothbrush is worn or the bristles are ragged or bent, buy a new toothbrush.

It is a good idea to get a NEW toothbrush every three months, or even sooner if you have been sick.

Toothbrushes tend to harbor bacteria and if you have been sick, your toothbrush should be tossed as soon as possible. I do not recommend one brand of toothbrush over another because it is how you brush — not what you use to brush — that is important.


Make sure you use a toothpaste that has fluoride in it. This type of toothpaste can reduce decay up to 40%. There are even some toothpastes that can be prescribed by your Dental Professional that have large amounts of fluoride incorporated into them. Your dentist may prescribe one of these if you are especially prone to developing decay.

Brush Properly!! This is a must. To clean the outside of your teeth, position the brush at a 45-degree angle where your gums and teeth meet and then gently move the brush in a circular motion using short gentle strokes. To clean the inside surfaces of your upper and lower front teeth, hold the brush vertically make several gentle strokes over each tooth and its surrounding gum tissue. And please spend at least 2-3 minutes brushing your teeth. Get a timer, or set your phone timer, do anything you can to brush your teeth for a minimum of 2 minutes.

To floss properly, gently place the floss between each tooth using a back-and-forth motion. Do not force or snap the floss into place, just use the gentle back-and-forth motion. Then curve the floss into a C-shape against one tooth and then the other. I talk to patients everyday that say they can't floss but they are all doing it wrong! The back-and-forth movement works!

Remember my friend! Only Floss The Teeth You Want To Keep!

## SVSU Hosting Lecture by Scholar on North Korea's Nuclear Crisis



Hyun-Wook Kim

An expert in one of the world's most dangerous foreign policy challenges – North Korea's nuclear weapons program – will speak on the topic at Saginaw Valley State University.

Hyun-Wook Kim will visit Wednesday, Nov. 14 at 7 p.m. in SVSU's Founders Hall. His presentation will address how North Korea's nuclear program changed the balance of power in Northeast Asia, and what that political environment means for the rest of the world.

The event is free and open to the public.

Kim has played a key role in shaping South Korea's policies towards China and the U.S. on the issue of North Korea's nuclear program.

He is a professor at the Seoul-based Korea National Diplomatic Academy, which is affiliated with South Korea's Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Kim also served as an advisory member for the National Security Council and today remains a standing member of the National Unification Advisory Council, an agency formed to advise the president of South Korea on peaceful unification policies between North and South Korea.

Kim received his bachelor's degree in political science from Yonsei University in Seoul. He received his master's degree and Ph.D. in political science from Brown University, and he worked at the University of Southern California as a postdoctoral fellow.

The lecture is part of SVSU's Barstow Excellence in Teaching Humanities Seminar, which was created to promote excellence in teaching and recognize scholarship in the humanities. The seminar was established through a gift from The Barstow Foundation, which supports education, health and human services agencies and humanitarian causes with emphasis on the greater Midland area.

Jarrett received her bachelor's degree in psychology from Stanford University in 1978 and received a Juris Doctor from the University of Michigan Law School in 1981.



# SVSU Serves Those Who Served, Again Earns 'Best for Vets' Ranking

Saginaw Valley State University has again been recognized for its support of military-affiliated students, earning a place in the Best for Vets: Colleges 2019 rankings by Military Times.

Chaz Fowler, a political science major from Bay City and a Marine Corps veteran, currently serves as a student liaison at SVSU's Military Student Affairs office. He said the transition from working in the military to returning to civilian life can be hard to navigate, but SVSU's resources can make it easier.

"Many veterans are commuter students," said Fowler. "This department gives them a place to be involved and included in university life. It provides a great environment for veterans to be around like-minded individuals and experiences. It really bridges the gap between vets to their academics as well as their community." For a school to be placed on the "Best for Vets" list, colleges and universities must be considered a good fit for service members, military veterans and their families.

SVSU is rated No. 101 among all four-year institutions nationwide in the 2019 rankings by the independent media organization dedicated to news and information about the military. This is the fifth consecutive year SVSU has earned the designation.

To be considered, colleges and universities complete a comprehensive survey which is evaluated by Military Times. Institutions were then ranked based on survey responses as well as on data collected by three different federal agencies.

Bethany Alford, SVSU's director of Military Student Affairs, said SVSU's assists students and family members with paperwork, accessing their federal benefits, academic advising, and generally serving as a "one-stop shop" for military-affiliated students. They also take pride in creating a friendly and welcoming place on campus.

"Our office creates an environment that is not just for information, but also a great place for conversations with other student veterans," she said. "They come in and can hear about what's happening on campus, but also can feel the comradery they've missed since leaving the service."

SVSU will acknowledge receiving the "Best for Vets" honor during a Veteran's Day event Thursday, Nov. 8 at 2 p.m. in the Curtiss Hall banquet rooms. Colonel Timothy Houchlei, state family programs director for the Michigan Army National Guard, will serve as the featured speaker.

Team One Credit Union was originally organized by a group of 15 teachers in 1935 as Saginaw Teachers Club Credit Union. Formed to fill a need as a place where teachers could receive financial assistance at reasonable rates, the purpose of this credit union was, and is, to encourage thrift (savings) among our members. In the early years, the credit union was maintained at Saginaw High School in the physics classroom of Mr. Poulson, who was also the credit union treasurer. In 1957, Dean Ruple and his wife, Lois, ran the credit union from their front porch. New teachers moving into the area were often given loans for clothes and an apartment. Because they were new to the area, and had no money, it was also common for Dean Ruple to give teachers the money to open an

In 1967, the Saginaw Main Office was opened and the first credit union employee, Don Pilon was hired and eventually became the first CEO of Team One Credit Union. Konnie Werner was named President/ CEO upon Don's retirement from the credit union. At the time of Konnie Werner's retirement, the Board of Directors named Gerald Hutto as her replacement as President/CEO. Since the credit union was established in 1935, we have seen tremendous growth in assets, loans and branch facilities as well as new services and technologies to serve our diverse membership. We have been able to accomplish this with the help of our dedicated and caring board and staff who have contributed their time and efforts for 80 years to the success of the credit union and for the benefit of our members.

On March 6, 1972, the Board of Directors approved the name change to Education Employees Credit Union and that name remained in effect until it was changed to Team One Credit Union in 1993. 

Michigan High School Athletic Association, representing the State Board of Education



Rita believes this approach "was and is critical to the success of DHHS and at-risk children and families

System of Care Coordinating Council, having worked closely with SCCMHA, families and many other community partners to establish a meaningful and lasting process – a process where the voices of children and youth would be heard, respected and considered when critical decisions were made regarding their futures.




educational challenge today is to prepare students to solve problems we have not yet imagined, which will use technology that has not yet been invented, in jobs that do not yet exist.


I am currently a Board member of the Francis Reh Public School Academy. I am also a published author through Xulon Press Publishing.

procedure would proceed from beginning to end. This way I would be ready for any possibility of what the surgeon would need.



area. We also operate a feeding program - last year serving 16,862 hot evening meals five days a week to community members dealing with




options for families and veterans. Mrs. McAfee grew the income stream from just over \$300,000 to over \$650,000.
