
Brandon Haskett, SVSU professor of

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

Delta College relocates "Monumento a la Raza" to Sculpture Walk

Delta College has relocated "Monumento a la Raza," created by former art student David Torrez, a pioneer of Chicano art in the Midwest, as part of its Hispanic Heritage Month 2023 celebration.

Initially installed in the college's courtyard, the concrete "stelae" - an upright inscribed concrete slab – was relocated to the east side of the main campus near the entrance of J Wing for open display.

On September 20, 1989, in celebra-

tion of Hispanic Heritage Month, Torrez, a Saginaw native, presented Delta College with the hand-carved 5-foottall Mayan monolith in tribute to his Mexican heritage. This statue is covered in carved images of maize, warrior kings, eagles, serpent boats, musical instruments and seashells with dates engraved on the side.

"As far as I know, the work is a oneof-a-kind anywhere. The stelae itself dates back thousands of years. It was used as a historical marker in front of Mayan temples, recording every 10 to 20 years of history," Torrez told The Saginaw News at the time.

Dr. John E. Vargas, D.O., his family and members of the Hispanic community commissioned the stelae that Conce (Sam) and Carmen Olvera dedicated in memory of their son Luis.

Lisa Sebbe, the oldest of Torrez's three children, recalled watching her father carve "Monumento a la Raza," which translates to "Monument to the Race," out of Styrofoam, rubber molding and cement.

"As a kid, I remember him talking through his process, explaining that he did deeper cuts because he needed to make the concrete show," Sebbe said.

Mary Ellen Torrez, sister of the artist and former Delta College staff member present during the installation ceremony, credited the muse of his lifelong creative expression as their father.

"Our parents moved here from Mexico, but our dad instilled in us a lot about our culture," she said. "David loved the ancient history of Mexico and the Mayans. He dedicated most of his drawings or murals to that."

"Monumento a la Raza" is now part of the Delta Sculpture Walk, a free outdoor collection of works showcasing multiple styles and media by various artists. Visitors and students can enjoy the works of art around campus 365 days a year.






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

El Día de los Muertos is not, as is commonly thought, a Mexican version of Halloween, though the two holidays do share some traditions, including costumes and parades. On the Day of the Dead, it's believed that the border between the spirit world and the real world dissolve. During this brief period, the souls of the dead awaken and return to the living world to feast, drink, dance and play music with their loved ones. In turn, the living family members treat the deceased as honored guests in their celebrations, and leave the deceased's favorite foods and other offerings at gravesites or on the ofrendas built in their homes. Ofrendas can be decorated with candles, bright marigolds called cempasuchil and red cock's combs alongside food like stacks of tortillas and fruit.

The most prominent symbols related to the Day of the Dead are calacas (skeletons) and calaveras (skulls). In the early 20th century, the printer and cartoonist José Guadalupe Posada incorporated skeletal figures in his art mocking politicians and commenting on revolutionary politics. His most well-known work, La Calavera Catrina, or Elegant Skull, features a female skeleton adorned with makeup and dressed in fancy clothes. The 1910 etching was intended as a statement about Mexicans adopting European fashions over their own heritage and traditions. La Calavera Catrina was then adopted as one of the most recognizable Day of the Dead icons.

During contemporary Day of the Dead festivities, people commonly wear skull masks and eat sugar candy molded into the shape of skulls. The pan de ánimas of All Souls Day rituals in Spain is reflected in pan de muerto, the traditional sweet baked good of Day of the Dead celebrations today. Other food and drink associated with the holiday, but consumed year-round as well, include spicy dark chocolate and the corn-based drink called atole. You can wish someone a happy Day of the Dead by saying, "Feliz día de los Muertos."

Are funders accountable?

By MEL AND PEARL SHAW

Consider starting a community conversation that uncovers who receives money from who and for what. Questions could include: What has been your history with local philanthropists and foundations? How do you rate them? In terms of the overall general community, do you know who is funded and at what levels? What about within the Black community? Have you been invited to apply for a grant? If yes, what was the process like? Accessible? Complicated? Have ever reached out to a funder or philanthropist? Has anyone reached out to you? Have you been funded? What was your experience Do you know how funding decisions are made in regard to projects in the Black community? Do you believe philanthropists and funders are transparent and accountable to the Black community?

Other questions can focus on funding recommendations. These can include: Based on the needs and strengths of the Black community, what do you believe should be funded? Do you believe the mission, vision, and goals of local philanthropists and funders meet the needs of the Black community? How can philanthropists and funders increase the positive impact they make on the Black community? What criteria would you suggest for determining which Black-led organizations should be funded? For example, can the value of Black people as artists, researchers, athletes, technologists, and musicians be as worthy of investment as "poverty fighting" programs? Are we only seen for our deficits or are strengths equally worthy of giving to?

There are also hard questions that can be asked. For example, Can non-Black funders and philanthropists have the sensitivity and know-how to make critical decisions regarding funding Black-led nonprofits? How would you offset what those who are not Black cannot see?

Nonprofits are coming together to talk about how they are funded, by whom, and importantly what they believe are the needs of the Black community. They are moving from informal conversations on the grapevine, to public conversations with the goal of seeing more money granted to Black-led nonprofits. Within some communities, funders and philanthropists are coming together to discuss equity in funding. They are creating guidelines for themselves that can lead to more equitable funding. Whether you are involved as a nonprofit leader or as a philanthropist or funder you can work with others to increase funding, transparency and accountability. The next step is yours! 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


Brandon Haskett, SVSU professor of

Saginaw Valley State University recently celebrated the advancement of nurses taking their final steps to becoming primary care family nurse practitioners. On August 28, 27 SVSU Primary Care Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) students received white coats and recited the white coat pledge, signifying their advancement into clinical work. The white coat ceremony reaffirms the science and healthcare community's support of the educational process that prepares future health providers for practice.

"These advanced practice nurses have taken steps to further their educations to fill crucial health care roles in the communities where they live and work," said Averetta Lewis, SVSU professor of nursing and coordinator of the FNP program. "By pursuing their master's degree, doctorate degree or post-graduate certificate in the FNP program, they are demonstrating their commitment to providing excellent patient care throughout Michigan."

The FNP students live and work in communities throughout Michigan. SV-SU's hybrid program, combining online courses with less-frequent face-to-face classes, enables them to pursue their advanced degree while maintaining their commitments to work and family.

The White Coat Ceremony was initiated in 1993 at Columbia University Vagelos College of Physicians & Surgeons by Arnold P. Gold, M.D., who was a professor and pediatric neurologist. Dr. Gold, a passionate advocate for humanistic healthcare, believed that the oath taken by new physicians at the end of medical school came too late. Through the nonprofit organization that he and his wife, Dr. Sandra Gold, started the Arnold P. Gold Foundation has expanded the White Coat Ceremony around the globe.

In 2014, recognizing the vital role nurses play in the healthcare team, the Gold Foundation partnered with the American Association of Colleges of Nursing to adopt a White Coat Ceremony for Nursing. More than 360 schools of nursing now participate, and the number continues to grow.

Saginaw Valley State University's family nurse practitioner program was developed by Sachiko Claus, who taught at SVSU for 29 years. Claus served as the lead faculty for the FNP program between 1995 and 2009. She passed away in August of this year.

SVSU has long been respected for its Bachelor of Science in Nursing program, and the university brings the same caliber of instruction to its graduate programs. SVSU's Master of Science in Nursing program is the most affordable master's program in Michigan and is also the state's only family nurse practitioner program with a rural health focus. In addition to the MSN and certificate programs, SVSU offers a Doctor of Nursing Practice degree, designed for nurses who work full-time, which can be completed in as little as three years.

For today's segment I would like to highlight Psychologist Lisa Damour and her work surrounding Chronic Absenteeism from school. This came to me on WNEM TV 5 during a segment which aired on CBS news on September 20th.

It is an excellent time to look at this emerging national crisis. As Dr. Damour explains, students who are chronically absent are twice the number that existed just three years ago, before the pandemic

I repeat: This is a national phenomenon. Just what is the definition of Chronic Absences and what causes them to happen?

A student is deemed to be chronically absent if they miss 10% (or more) days of school in a school year for any reason. In most Michigan schools, that is 18 or 19 absences in a school year. By the month, this would be 2 absences each month, or roughly one day every couple of weeks.

Looking at this from a "real world" view, that is a lot of time being away from school.

What causes Chronic Absences to pile up?

According to Damour, anxiety is a leading cause. Students are anxious about school and want to stay away as a result. This is a slippery slope, as she explains. When students stay home, it makes going back to school that much harder. The student gets behind in school work, feel lost (more anxiety!), and grades suffer.

What can be done to combat Chronic

I will offer three suggestions from my own experiences.

1st, parents and teachers need to roll up their sleeves and find out what is going on.

Find out what may be causing the anxiety and address it together.

2nd, create a plan together to work things out. Communicate with each other on a regular basis to monitor what may be working or not working. Form a united team that is determined to support the student.

Finally, consider getting some outside help from a guidance counselor, coach, or mentor. The voice of a third person who can support the teacher and parent may be the key to convince the student that being away from school is not a solution; instead, being away from school compounds the challenges and makes things worse.

I applaud CBS for highlighting this national problem, amplified by fallout from the pandemic. I firmly believe that together, parents and schools can address this on a case-by-case basis.



DOW WAS ANNOUNCED AS PRESENTING SPONSOR OF THE 2024 MEMORIAL CUP AT A SEPTEMBER 28 PRESS CONFERENCE

Awarded to the best team in junior hockey, the Memorial Cup is one of the most coveted trophies in the sport and it has shaped the way junior hockey is played in North America. First awarded in 1919, in remembrance of the many soldiers who paid the supreme sacrifice for Canada in the First World War, the Memorial Cup was rededicated to the memory of all fallen Canadian Military Personnel in 2010.

As hosts, the Saginaw Spirit will be one of four teams to participate in the 2024 Memorial Cup presented by Dow alongside the playoff champion from each of the OHL, QMJHL, and WHL. All games will be played at the Dow Event Center and ticket sales for the 2024 Memorial Cup presented by Dow will be available for purchase to the public starting on Wednesday, October 11.

The most recent Memorial Cup took place in Kamloops and saw the Québec Remparts defeat the Seattle Thunderbirds 5-0 in the final to win the CHL's top prize last June. Stevenson Standout inducted to CMU Hall of Fame

A former Stevenson High School football standout is being inducted this year into the Central Michigan University Athletics Hall of Fame.

Frank Zombo, who graduated from Stevenson High School in 2005, played for the Chippewas from 2006-2009.

He later played professional football as a linebacker for the Green Bay Packers and the Kansas City Chiefs. He was part of the Packers team that won the Super Bowl XLV in 2011.

"Zombo was a freak of an athlete," said former defensive teammate Daniel Jackson. "He was an absolute monster and he would find a way to get to the ball every time."

Jackson remembered Zombo's epic game against Northern Illinois University where he recorded his first pick-six as a senior.

"When I saw that ball go into Zombo's hands, I knew he was headed for the end-zone," said Jackson. "That man was running like a freight train and the crowd went bonkers."

He earned First Team All-MAC honors in 2008 and 2009 while helping CMU win three MAC Championships, a pair of bowl victories and four bowl game appearances.

Zombo was also 4-0 against Western Michigan.

He played nine seasons in the National Football League, three with the Green Bay Packers and six with the Kansas City Chiefs.

Also won a Super Bowl in 2011 with the Green Bay Packers, while recording a sack and five tackles in the game.

Three more Chippewas appeared in that game, including teammate Josh Gordy and Cullen Jenkins for the Packers while standout wide receiver Antonio Brown was the opposing foe with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

"It was a wild experience," said former defensive back Josh Gordy. "Imagine that you were playing with these guys in college a couple years ago and now we're seeing them in different uniforms and on a bigger stage. It was something I've never experienced before."

Zombo finished his NFL career with 196 tackles, 12.5 sacks and 15.0 tackles-forloss. He posted nine sacks in 2008, which ranks fifth in CMU single-season history and ranks third all-time in CMU history in sacks (25.5) and sixth all-time in tackles-for-loss (39).

In his four-year, 55-game career, he totaled 181 tackles (79 solo), 39.0 tackles for loss for 193 yards, 25.5 sacks for 165 yards, forced two fumbles and recovered four fumbles.

He finished with season-bests of 9.0 sacks and 10.0 tackles for loss as a junior in 2008—totaled a single-season best 62 tackles, 7.5 sacks and 10.5 tackles for loss as a sophomore in 2007.

Zombo was named a CoSIDA Academic All-District IV second team honoree in 2007, 2008 and 2009.

"I hated lining up against Zombo," said former teammate David Blackburn jokingly, who played tight end for the university. "Every time they called a play, I was hoping to get out on a route so I wouldn't have to worry about hitting Zombo. I could just go about and be on my way."

The 2023 class will be inducted into the hall of fame on Friday and honored at CMU's football game the following day against Eastern Michigan on Saturday.

Tullis enjoying role as Detroit Cody's first female JV head coach, Varsity staff

Head coach of the Detroit Venom women's football team Darnell Bryce has worked with many talented football players over the years at Detroit Cody High School.

Yet, he's never come across such an athlete as Women's Football Alliance's two-time offensive MVP Clarissa Tullis.

"I've worked with 'Riss' defensively over the past five years and nobody, male or female, has the work ethic like she has," he said. "I've watched her get bigger and stronger throughout the years and became a leader right in front of my eyes. She went from dominating on defense to doing the same thing on offense."

Her former head coach noted how special Tullis was when it came to having her on his team.

"You can't teach heart," said Keith Thomas, former head coach of the Detroit Dark Angels (prior to team changing name to Venom). "She's easily the heart of the team. Riss gives her heart to the game of football. That's why she has earned all the accolades that she has. Every team wants her on their roster and I don't blame them."

It only made sense for Bryce to hire Tullis as the head JV football coach once he earned the varsity head coach position at Detroit Cody High School.

Tullis, who's taking a year hiatus from football to recover from injuries, still needed to surround herself with the sport. Coming off of a rough 1-5 season in Detroit's debut in Div. I and representing Team USA in the women's football international games, Tullis wasted no time finding a way to put her football knowledge to good use.

She finished the 2023 season as the third-leading rusher in the WFA with 81 carries for 466 yards and one touchdown. Injuries took a toll on her performance as she usually averages over 1,500 rushing yards a season.

Tullis began volunteering with off-season workouts at the high school with the running backs.

Players were slow to warm up to Tullis, but that quickly turned around as they realized that she is well seasoned in the game.

"It took them a minute to buy in," she said. "They didn't believe that I knew football because I was a female. I showed them my highlight reel. I showed them that I was a player in pads just like them. Once they saw that I had true experience on the gridiron, it was a matter of time for them to buy into the game plan."

Tullis is currently sitting at 1-1 as the JV coach. The team recently lost in a 16-14 nail-biter to Detroit Denby.

She didn't think that she was ready for the responsibility, but Bryce instilled confidence in her as she was perfect for the job.

"I honestly just wanted to be a position's coach," she said. "I didn't think that I was ready to do all the planning for the offense and defense. Though I have a coordinator on both sides, I still have the final decision on everything and it's a lot. I'm new to this, but I am up for the challenge and it will keep me excited about the game as I'm healing from my injuries."


Bryce has even asked Tullis to join the varsity staff this season to coach defensive backs and running backs.

"I understand what my coaches go through now," she said. "From evaluating talent to placement on the field, it's amazing how so much preparation goes into the game from the coach's perspective compared to executing as a player."

Tullis is uncertain about her next career move once she's been cleared to play, but she does plan to start training to prepare for the 2024 season.

PONTIAC PHARAOHS

Basketball tryouts for Pontiac Pharaohs begin Oct. 21

Teams from The Basketball League are hosting tryouts all over the country and now it's Michigan's turn to find the best hoop talent for their professional league.

The first round of tryouts begin Oct. 21, followed by another session on Nov. 11 and a final one on Jan. 20, 2024.

Registration begins at \$100 for one tryout, \$180 for two tryouts and \$250 for three tryouts. Cost is \$120 if a player is paying at the door for each.

The team moved from Lansing last year after sitting out the 2023 season. It will be the TBL's 50th team to join the league along with the Jacksonville 95ers.

"We are thrilled to have the Pharaohs back next season", Magley told TBL News' Brad Smith. "They were very competitive in their first season and I have no doubt that the city of Pontiac will love what they bring to the community off the court.

TBL CEO and owner Evelyn Magley was not available for comment. She was named Hope Magazine's Top 25 as she is the only female owner of a men's basketball league.

Pontiac will be able to participate in TBL's upcoming 2023 free agency period and the 2023 draft, allowing the Pharaohs to add talent ahead of the 2024 season.

So far, Pontiac has already named Scott Newman as head coach and vice president of basketball operations, while partnering with the Pontiac school district to play all home games in Pontiac High School Gymnasium.

This partnership will allow Pontiac's youth to interact with the Pharaohs' pro players on a regular basis, providing access to internship opportunities throughout the season, and creating a fun, affordable experience that everyone can be a part of and enjoy.

Pontiac will begin their second season in the TBL after debuting in the 2022 season. For reference, the Pharaohs finished with a 15-9 regular-season record, +139 point differential, and third in the Upper Midwest division, but were swept by Glass City in the first round of the playoffs.

With a season-average of 113.2 PPG (9th in TBL) on 46.5% shooting from the field (24th in TBL), 34.3% from threepoint range (20th in TBL), and nine different Pharaohs averaging 10.0+ PPG, Lansing's success was largely attributed to their stout offense.

The team is owned by entrepreneur Chris Jackson. Scott Newman was announced as the team's head coach. Previously he served as the assistant coach of Windsor Express.

Due to the aforementioned absence from the TBL for the 2023 season, Pontiac's roster will be much different than their roster in 2022.

According to TBL News, Jackson and Davis both signed with the Windsor Express of the National Basketball League of Canada (NBLC), with Jackson winning the NBLC's Sixth Man Award and being named to All-NBLC First Team, while Davis made the All-NBLC second team. In addition, Muldrow, Jones, and Brundidge all didn't play in the TBL this past season, meaning Pontiac may begin the 2024 TBL season without their five leading scorers from the 2022 season.

Belleville's Underwood visits Coach Prime, **University of Colorado**

With rumors of Colorado's starting quarterback Shedeur Sanders entering the NFL draft after this season, head coach Deion Sanders may have his replacement coming in hot.

The No. 1 2025 quarterback recruit in the country visited the University of Colorado two weeks ago to watch the Buffaloes take on their in-state rivals at Colorado State.

Five-star junior Bryce Underwood was originally planning to visit USC at the end of the month, but decided to take a trip to Boulder instead.

"It was a last-minute decision," Underwood's father Jaquan confirmed regarding the change in plans.

Ironically, the no. 5 Trojans will be in town to face the Buffaloes next week, but Underwood and the Tigers will be enjoying their homecoming game that same week.

Underwood recalled it as quite the experience getting to watch Coach Prime and his staff operate on game day and soak in the environment at Folsom Field. His family also said that the trip was worth it.

"It was very exciting to have my first conversation with him (Coach Prime)," Underwood told 247Sports. "It was good to have my first conversation with him and it went well. Just him letting me know he wanted me there and to lead them to a National Championship was exciting to hear."

Colorado was able to squeak past Colorado State, 43-35 in double overtime. Though it was a thrilling game to watch and silencing head coach Jay Norvell's pre-game trash talk was probably satisfying to Coach Prime, the Buffaloes dropped down a spot to no. 19 in the AP rankings.

Standout two-way athlete Travis Hunter went down in the first half and later left the game with a lacerated liver.

He's expected to be missing out of action for three weeks.

Mr. Underwood made pleasant com-

ments about how he likes the offense and how Shedeur spreads the ball around.

"They're definitely in the picture which is a great thing," Jaquan said.

"We were able to talk to (Coach) Prime. Everybody pitches they want Bryce to take the keys to their offense. They think he's a guy to back up or be mentored by Shedeur. Just having that opportunity and Prime is a legend. When I was a kid, I wanted to be like Prime. I played corner. Having that guy on the other end talking to my son, it was surreal. We really like Colorado."

Underwood also really likes schools like Alabama, LSU, Michigan and Oregon with dozens of offers from several Div. I schools. He'll be returning to Baton Rouge, La., when LSU hosts Auburn.

The two-time state champion finished his sophomore campaign completing 65% of his passes for 2,751 yards and 37 touch-

downs with another 642 yards rushing and eight touchdowns. The march to another ring included playoff victories over Saline, Catholic Central, Cass Tech and Caledonia in the finale, all prominent programs. In Underwood's ninth-grade campaign he threw for nearly 3,000 yards and 39 touchdowns to just four interceptions.

The 6-foot-2, 185-pound junior may be the perfect fit for the Colorado offense in case Shedeur decides to declare for the 2024 NFL draft. If he does decide to stay, it would be a perfect mentorship for him as he would get acclimated to Big 12 play and build Colorado to a national championship contender.

The Buffaloes are in their final season in the Pac-12 and will be an official Big 12 member starting next season.

Colorado just suffered its first loss of the season at the hands of Oregon, 42-6.













